

June 2021 issue highlights

The June edition of *ABR* is a new bonus issue – marking our transition to eleven issues per year instead of ten. The special issue contains more creative writing, several commentaries, and longer review essays, including:

- ◆ **Ilana Snyder's** thoughtful and nuanced article about the recent turmoil in Israel and Gaza. Ilana is the president of the New Israel Fund Australia and a long-time contributor to and board member of *ABR*.
- ◆ **Declan Fry's** questioning reading of two new books by **Stan Grant**: Grant's contribution to Black Inc.'s Writers on Writers series, *On Thomas Keneally*, and *With the Falling of the Dusk* (HarperCollins). Stan Grant is also our Open Page interview subject in June.
- ◆ The latest essay by *ABR* **Behrouz Boochani Fellow Hessom Razavi** focusing on Australia's attitudes to people seeking asylum. Dr Razavi draws on conversations with a dozen journalists, lawyers, psychologists, people working with refugees, and Behrouz Boochani himself, now settled in New Zealand after his own long incarceration on Manus Island.
- ◆ An article by **Martin Thomas** – past Calibre Essay Prize winner and current co-director of the Menzies Australia Institute at King's College in London – in which he revisits **Patrick White** thirty-one years after White's death and asks why he is now so little read or heeded. Thomas suspects that White, surveying us from 'some gumtree in the sky', would be 'bathing in the lack of glory' – perverse and utterly individual to the last.
- ◆ A brilliant review essay from **Lisa Gorton** in which she engages with the new translation of **Beowulf** by **Maria Dahvana Headley**.
